13:00-14:00	Part 2B: Face to Face Discussions	These discussions take place in most of the local teach-ins, particularly those having organizing meetings.		
<b>Potential Formats (Pick what works for you locally).</b>	Group breakouts on different themes running concurrently if you have extra rooms.	Presentation, small group discussions in groups of three, presentation.	Questions by seminar leader of potential ways forward, answers from audience. Audience questions, seminar leader answers.	Listening to part of the Click Webinar broadcast, discussions around that.
<b>Potential Questions</b>	These are questions that might be addressed in face-to-face meetings. These are suggestions, but some of the items (even if addressed briefly) are critical.			
<b>1. React to program heard.</b>	What do we think about what the speakers said? How could this apply or not to local conditions? What can we do about such things locally? What are the obstacles and how might they be overcome?			
<b>2. Agenda for local action.</b>	What are the top agenda items for organizing at the local, state, national and global level? Which should be priorities? Can we act at more than one scale of activity, if so how?			
<b>3. Global Networking</b>	To the extent we participate in a global teach-in, we are already part of a global network with potential media, political and even economic synergies. How can we best make use of such a network?			
<b>4. Reflective Critique</b>	What have been the strengths and weaknesses of the local organizing process? What have been the strengths and weakness of the global organizing process? What suggestions do we have for designing the process differently?			
<b>5. Content/Form Problems</b>	How could we balance greater participation in decision-making in a global network with the problem that our agenda could be watered down by larger forces in the media, politics, or even other social movement activities?			
<b>6. Pedagogic Continuity</b>	Are we interested or prepared to commit to a global study/action circle which could provide a foundation for global knowledge and action exchanges?			
<b>7. Follow Up Actions</b>	What should we do next or what are we willing to do next to create continuity for the global teach-in process? Examples: move your money campaigns, study-action circles, alternative banks, alternative utilities, cooperatives/democratic economy initiatives, instructional videos, conference calls discussions about organizing, etc.?
